Parent Involvement Policy

Oark School strives everyday to provide a high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables the participating children to meet the state's student academic achievement standards.

With the help and hard work of parents we have developed the school's Parent Involvement Policy. Each school year time is set aside to review and work on improvements for the Parent Involvement Policy. Parents are encouraged to keep informed, ask questions, and they may request meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions relating to the education of their children. A copy of the Parent Involvement Policy is kept on file in our school's parent resource center and distributed at our annual Title One Meeting.

Each year the school holds a Title 1 meeting to inform the parents of the schools participation in the Title 1 program and to explain the requirements of the program and their right to be involved. This meeting is often a part of a parent involvement meeting and a Parent-Teacher Organization activity.

Parent-Teacher conferences are held once per semester relating to the individual child's achievement. Parent-Involvement Meetings are held during the school year. Sometimes these meetings focus on one particular group of students/parents and others where we focus on all the state's academic content standards and student achievement standards, local academic assessments and how to monitor their child's progress and work with teachers to improvement of their children. Through parent-involvement activities parents are given the opportunity to be trained to work with their children to improve their children's achievement, such as literacy training and using technology.

Oark School will provide parents with Title 1 funds to pay for reasonable expenses associated with parent involvement activities, such as transportation, childcare, or home visit expenses.

We provide parents with information about Title 1 programs that includes a description and explanation of the school's curriculum, academic assessments used to measure children's progress and proficiency levels students are expected to meet.

Surveys are used as one method of finding out how parents perceive our program and ideas they may have improvement.
